Clue: only take questions which have a yes and no answer. String it


out to develop inquisitiveness.

NEWS FROM MALTA



We are in the process of forming "Skejjel Rakkontaturi" - the Maltese Branch of Storytelling Schools, to be located within the dynamic National Literacy Agency. Last year, together, we ran a pilot programme training 9 primary schools across the islands in the Storytelling Schools approach. This year the programme will expand to another dozen or so schools including two middle schools. We are training a group of Maltese literacy trainers to sustain the programme in the long term.


The NLA has adopted our approach as a creative, skill-focussed, learning-by-doing approach to education as they move away from more traditional methods to more effective modern approaches. It will

provide us with invaluable learning about the management of change in a national educational system. One distinctive feature of the Maltese situation is the bilingual policy of the government. The programme will be trialled in both English and Maltese and we plan to produce a full set of resources in Maltese.
